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Hope for Learning through Mistakes

Nueva Esperanza enrolls children from all kinds of family backgrounds. Most of our children are raised by single mothers, others live with a grandparent, and very few children live with both of their parents. Not only are family structures varied, but our children also struggle with a lot of personal issues that they bring to the ministry daily. As we aim to show these children the love of Christ, we also want to do that through the way we teach them about consequences.



A lot of the children at the ministry struggle with the issue of family instability. That means that the family members in their lives may not be constant, or they might move often to live with different family members. This issue can bring a lot of insecurity. Students may also witness types of physical or verbal abuse. A lot of children live in dangerous neighborhoods where they may also see things that influence their thoughts and actions.

Some behaviors that we see among our children here at the ministry are kicking, hitting, and throwing things when they are angry. They may also say unkind words to one another. There is often a lot of fighting and arguing among classmates. A lot of these actions however stem from what might be modeled to them in some form or another.

Since coming to Honduras to work as a missionary with Nueva Esperanza, I have had the opportunity to work with children who make bad decisions and turn those decisions into opportunities for learning. Instead of simply punishing students for doing something that is against the rules, we strive to work with them to help them learn what some appropriate behaviors might be.

During one of our chapels, we even taught the students what they can do when they become angry. Instead of simply telling these children what they should do, taking time to teach them what they can do and why we make better decisions is so valuable.

Hope for the Future of Nueva Esperanza Children

As Nueva Esperanza closes in on its 25th year, there have been 451 students enrolled in the ministry past and present. It is a joy to be able to see past students when they visit and tell us how their lives have changed because of the ministry. During our youth event with the Prayer Team, Cendy, who was four years old when she was enrolled at the ministry in 1994, came to visit. She had met Lester, the leader of the PrayerTeam, back in 1999 when he first came to the ministry and surprised him with her visit. She brought her two children and niece with her as well for the surprise.

Cendy's story of how she came to Nueva Esperanza was much like many other children who have gone through our program. Cendy was the youngest children when she enrolled, and her family lived in a wooden house in a very



poor area near the ministry. Her father did not help much financially and only visited on occasion. Cendy's mother Rosa decided to fill out an application for Nueva Esperanza because she wasn't able to take care of Cendy and make sufficient funds to take care of the rest of her children. So, on July 4, 1994, Cendy joined the ministry.



Cendy recently told us that once she started attending Nueva Esperanza, she always had school supplies, sufficient meals at the ministry, and even Christmas gifts. These were often things that her sisters lacked because they were not a part of Nueva Esperanza. She

also explained that Nueva Esperanza is where she learned about God. Her mother did not take her and her sisters to church or ever talk about God at home. She also learned good morals and how to treat and relate with others.

Although Cendy was no longer eligible to continue receiving a scholarship through Nueva Esperanza after the eleventh grade because she did not pass her classes that year, she did make it up through summer school classes and continued at public school. It was also around the same time that Cendy's mother left to live in the United States. By the time Cendy was 16, she was only living with her 19 year old sister. All of her other sisters had moved to the states with her mother. She did graduate from the local high school she attended in 2007.

Cendy got married in 2011 to her husband Jose Elias. He is a general manager at a store that evaluates cars and sells car parts for European cars. Together they have two children, their son Pablo who is 7 and their daughter Ema who is 1½. Pablo is in first grade at a private, Christian, bilingual school where he has received High Honors for his academics. Ema is a young toddler with a very vibrant personality. Cendy is currently taking care of her kids and studying Marketing at the local university. She plans on graduating with her Bachelor's degree in March 2018.

Nueva Esperanza had a great impact on Cendy's life. She expressed that her life now is very different from any of her siblings. They never graduated from high school, and she is now in college. She's happily married and able to provide her son with a private, high quality

education.

Cendy was moved to tears as she expressed how much the ministry was able to provide for her physically, spiritually, and educationally. She believes the opportunities she had a Nueva Esperanza helped motivate and encourage her to ensure that her children grew up differently than she did.
