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PATRONIZATION OF THE POOR

Patronization is a word that we do not hear very often. It is important to define this word when working in a cross-cultural missions context. Being a Patron can be positive and negative. Short-term missions often times models the unintended consequences of patronization of the poor. It is important that Christians engaging in missions behave in a manner that treats others with dignity and respect.

Definition pa·tron·ize

tr.v. pa·tron·ized, pa·tron·iz·ing, pa·tron·iz·es

- 1. To act as a patron to; support or sponsor
- 2. To go to as a customer, especially on a regular basis
- 3. To treat in a condescending manner, often in showing interest or kindness that is insincere

When I lived in Haiti, children who did not know me would come up to me and call me Patron. I have been called many things, but this was a first for me. I wasn't sure if it was a good or bad name to be called. The first two definitions of the word patronize are optimistic in nature. Holding the title of Patron is positive especially when you are providing business for someone who is giving you a service. It is also beneficial to support an organization and sponsor a group or individual that is doing effective work. I have been taught that it is better to give than to receive. The children in Haiti, after calling me Patron, would then ask me, a complete stranger, for money. There is plenty of goodness that comes with patronization, but the third definition lends a different meaning to the word.

Have you ever felt patronized by someone in a position of power over you? Do you remember what it felt like? When you are treated in a condescending manner, your sense of dignity and respect is stripped away. The person in power often times does not even realize that they are hurting those whom they have power over. These are the unintended consequences. It is important to be careful when working with the "poor" that we do not strip away their dignity and at the same time increase their dependency.

When I went to the game parks in Kenya, a sign read, "Do not feed the animals." If all of the tourists fed the animals, they would stop doing what they naturally do and this would put them at risk. "When we do for those in need what they have the capacity to do for themselves, we disempower them" (Lupton, Toxic Charity). I have seen this model perpetuated in short-term missions too often.

This summer my church brought a group of High School students to participate in the ministry of Nueva Esperanza. Our church has known this organization for a number of years. That number is not nearly as important as the relationship that has been established with our friends in Tegucigalpa. Our students told their friends and family that they were going to serve the "poor" people of Honduras. Serving the poor is good, but I challenged our students to think about poverty in another way. Labeling someone as poor simply because they lack financial capital is patronization in the negative sense. In our own culture, there are poverties that exist that we don't consider. I asked our students to consider the joy that they encounter when the children at Nueva Esperanza play with bottle caps. I asked them to look at how the Honduran people live out authentic community without all of the conveniences of modern technology.

By the end of our time in Honduras, our students recognized the uniqueness of Nueva Esperanza as a ministry. There is no sign outside of the door to remind the children and their parents that they are financially poor. They work hard to instill dignity by coming alongside the children in their community to reinforce what they are learning in school. They continue to develop in them the knowledge that God uniquely designed them and loves them beyond imagination. Nueva Esperanza understands that adopting all of the children into homes in the United States is not the solution to their problems. They have developed a program that provides kids with an environment where they learn that God loves them and that there is hope to continue to press on regardless of their circumstances while remaining connected to their families.

This is an organization that, although not perfect, is leading the way in how to reach out with the Gospel of Jesus by loving children and their families without patronizing them. I highly

recommend Nueva Esperanza to any group who is eager to be challenged to grow in their faith.



CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

Our conference space in the Team House is almost complete! Over half of the work done on this area was done by teams. Thank you to everyone who played a part in adding this extension to our ministry. Teams this summer had the chance to use this space for devotions and free time, and it has been amazing to watch our vision for the space come to life.

This year, we were also able to gift 10 bunk beds to families we serve thanks to our teams! When you come to Honduras with a team, your team will build and deliver a bunk bed to one of our families.
